Even the guys at the National Weather Service at Cleveland Hopkins International Airport are getting obsessed with wringing something new out of the drippy data.

"Everybody's talking about it because it seems like it's raining every day," said meteorologist Marty Thompson.

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Soggy year, soggy spring

Second wettest spring in over a century


It sure did in March and April, when it rained on 54 of 61 days, the highest total on record in more than a century of weather data in Cleveland.

But Thompson said it was fellow meteorologist Marty Mullen who slogged some weather data overnight Sunday to put everyone's misery into some more historical perspective.

"The numbers really tell the story about just how wet and miserable it's been," Thompson said. "It's really all everyone is talking about."

Here are the facts: From Jan. 1 through May 15, we've had 20.64 inches of precipitation. That's second only to the 22.45 inches in 1950.

"Everybody's also wondering when it's going to be over — and it doesn't look like any time soon," Thompson said. "Worse, the long-term forecast for early summer is also cooler
