Lake County Planning and Community Development administers Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds received on an annual basis from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The funds are made available to carry out a variety of housing, community, and economic development activities based on an Annual Action Plan approved by the Lake County Commissioners. The Lake County Board of Commissioners announces the proposed substantial amendment to the Consolidated Plan/2019 Annual Action Plan for projects to be funded with a special allocation to this jurisdiction to be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus (COVID-19). This allocation was authorized by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), Public Law 116-136. The CARES Act made available Community Development Block Grant Coronavirus (CDBG-CV) funds. This jurisdiction's allocation of round 3 funds is \$720,275.

The Planning and Community Development office is asking the Lake County Board of Commissioners approval to allocate \$720,275 of available funds for the purpose of funding new grant projects and activities described within Section III of this document.

II. Process Review

The funds received annually from HUD are subject to the HUD Consolidated Plan regulations found at 24 CFR Part 91, which requires the County to prepare a five-year Consolidated Plan, Annual Action Plans and Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Reports. The regulations require Citizen Participation as part of the development and approval of these documents.

Citizen Participation is governed by the Citizen Participation Plan, which is reflective of the Part 91 regulations. According to the County's current adopted Citizen Participation Plan, changes to the Action Plan are considered "Substantial Amendments" when any of the following occurs (Section F):

- addition of new resources or the use of greater than 20% of the annual allocation of either CDBG or HOME Program,
- or a significant change (50%) in the scope, outcome or number of beneficiaries of an approved project level for which funds have already been approved by HUD.

Any qualifying proposed substantial amendments will be publicized through a public notice in the local newspaper. After approval by the Commissioners, a period of thirty days will be provided to receive public comments on any qualifying proposed substantial amendments before the amendment is sent to HUD for review and approval. HUD approval is required before an amendment can be implemented. The County will consider any comments submitted orally, in writing or in electronic form in preparing the substantial amendment to the Consolidated Plan or Annual Action Plan. Any comments or view of citizens received in writing or orally shall be considered. A summary of the comment or view will be attached to the substantial amendment upon submission to HUD.

The CARES Act adds additional flexibility for both the CDBG-CV grant and, in some cases, for the annual FY2020 CDBG grants in these unprecedented times. The public comment period is reduced to not less than 5 days, grantees may use virtual public hearings when necessary for public health reasons, the public service cap is suspended during the emergency, and States and local governments may reimburse costs of eligible activities incurred for pandemic response regardless of the date.

These changes constitute a substantial amendment because there is a significant change in the scope, outcome and/or number of beneficiaries of an approved project level for which funds have already been approved. Additionally, in HUD Memorandum from John Gibbs, Acting Assistant Secretary for Community Planning and Development, *CARES ACT Flexibility for CDBG Funds Used to Support Coronavirus Response and plan amendment waiver*, grantees are instructed to proceed with all amendments and plans under the new provisions outlined in the memo by adding the CDBG-CV allocation in their plans as an available resource for the year. Lake County's Citizen Participation Plan was updated and revised by Resolution on April 30, 2020 to allow for the new flexibilities.

Economic Development is identified in the existing approved Consolidated Plan (2017 – 2021) as a priority need (SP-25), "Provide increased economic development opportunities in the jurisdiction; offer gap financing to businesses that will comply with job creation requirements." Additionally, economic development is an identified category under the "Goals" section of the Consolidated Plan (SP-45), "Promote a regionally coordinated economic development planning strategy, which includes business, non-profits, officials from the County and its communities, officials from outside the County, and area residents that identifies ways to create and maintain employment in lower to middle income sectors of the workforce."

Social Services Support is identified in the existing approved Consolidated Plan as a priority need (SP-25), "Support essential services such as, employment training, health care, and mental health." Additionally, supportive services is an identified category under the "Goals" section of the Consolidated Plan (SP-45), "Provide assistance to nonprofit organizations that provide needed supportive services to low/mod income persons living in the community, including but not limited to job training, senior services, health care, and homeless prevention."

Public facilities improvements is identified in the existing approved Consolidated Plan as a high priority need (SP-25). "Provide improvements to local facilities which benefit the public in low-income block groups and which improve accessibility in all areas of the jurisdiction." Additionally, suitable living environment is an identified category under the "Goals" section of the Consolidated Plan (SP-45), "Allocate CDBG resources to support public facility improvement activities that will assist with addressing the problem of aging and insufficient facilities in residential areas that have high concentrations of low-to-moderate income households."

IV. Citizen Participation

In accordance with Lake County's Citizen Participation Plan, a public notice was published in the News-Herald newspaper on Monday, November 30, 2020 notifying the public of this Substantial Amendment and of the opportunity to submit written comments to the Lake County Planning and Community Development office (LC P&CD) or to provide oral comments during the Public Hearing on Thursday, December 10, 2020 at the Lake County Commissioner's Chambers and will be broadcast live via YouTube an allows questions in real time with answers coming from the Planning and Community Development staff hosting the meeting. Public comments were received from November 30, 2020 to January 4, 2021.

Humane Society relying on 'ensemble cast' amid virus

Whenever people work with animals, it's a surprise everyday.

That's the view of Lee Neiser, the executive director of the Lake Humane Society and Adoption Center.

"No day is the same day, so it teaches us to become able to think on our feet every day, as well as being able to take the cat home, or the dog, and try them out for a week," Casati said.

That's a great opportunity to be able to see if that animal is going to fit into your home without doing the full adoption process.

Since the Center for Adoption program, very few animals have been returned, Casati said, but if they do get returned, it's not a big deal.

The program has been successful enough to keep in place after the pandemic is over, she said.

"I think that adopters appreciate having that flexibility," Casati said. "If it doesn't work out for some reason, they don't have the guilt of having to bring an animal home."

When COVID-19 started back in March, the Lake Humane Society decided to institute the "Foster to Adopt" program.

"We're here for all people in the community," Neiser said. "Whether they're in a home or in the shelter, we don't want these four walls to be the only place that we're looking out for animals. It's throughout the county. People who are interested in adopting an animal may not know the associated guidelines," Casati said.

They're not even being asked to adopt. They may just stay in because they want to bring their kids to see the animals."

Staff members miss seeing everyone in the shelter, Casati said. Live events such as Rescue Rock Off and Black Cat Ball were canceled due to the pandemic which normally cover 20% of the society's budget, she said.

One of her favorite parts of my job is watching the animals get adopted and go home with their forever families," Casati said.

"Working from home right now, I feel disconnected from the animals and the shelter life that I had gotten used to."

The society's supporters have participated in virtual fundraisers, but it's not the same, Casati said.

"We understand we're in the same position as a lot of nonprofits are right now," she said. "We just feel lucky that people have continued to support us through not only financially, but also through physical donations."

"The choices of Lake County are always given the option to be as flexible as possible, but we're already begun implementing the program for bringing in stray animals and owner relinquished animals has been slowed, Neiser said.

Specialized dockets place qualified individuals in a court-monitored program in lieu of incarceration. Judges refer defendants to a specialized docket if they believe that the defendant meets the requirements and would be a good candidate for the program.

Defendants may have to go through an evaluation to determine if they would benefit from participation in mental health court. This could include a psychiatric evaluation and a look at criminal history.

Once an offender has been medically stabilized, that person comes back to court with a lawyer.

The offender pleads guilty to the charges and officially enters the mental health court program, typically a probation-based program.

This type of probation is immediate with a court-designated specialty docket specifically for mentally ill offenders, people with addiction and drug use, and other special needs.

Each specialty docket commission has a goal toward helping victims and others preventing recidivism.

The first requirement is always compliance with treatment. The case manager and the court work together to ensure that the person stays on their medication. The case manager also helps the defendant take any necessary steps to get their medication.

Please consider the proposed timeline and allocation plan for the special allocation Community Development Block Grant Coronavirus (CDBG-CV). The third-round allocation is \$720,275.

HUD requires a Substantial Amendment to Lake County's FY-19 Annual Action Plan to add CDBG-CV funds to the budget and allocate at a project-level.

The amendment process will proceed as follows:

- 11/12/20: Commissioners approve allocation plan for CDBG-CV funds (project-level, not specific activities)
- 11/16/20: Publish public notice including list of new projects to be funded with CDBG-CV
- 11/24/20: Public Hearing/30-day public comment period through 12/17/20
- 01/01/21: Amendment submitted to HUD after the CAPER (end of the year report) is completed. RB to send out RFP's and gather proposals for specific activities.
- 01/15/21: HUD approves amendment...Resolution approved by BCC authorizing agreements and activities may be implemented
